WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

To William E. Winslow, a Constable of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth qualified to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town House in town on the seventh day of March, 1892, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer and School Committee.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintainance and support of schools and the poor, and repairs of roads and bridges and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see what method the town will adopt to repair the highways for the ensuing year.

Eighth. To see what the town will allow per hour for the labor of men, horses and oxen on the highway.

Ninth. To see if the town will accept the road as laid out by the Selectmen on petition of M. O. Huston and thirty-one others, leading by the house of B. F. Hall and continuing from the northerly terminus of said road over lands of John Woodbury and others, and entering the old Gray road at a point near the house of William Leighton, and raise money to build the same.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Eleventh. To see if the town will abate the highway tax of Christian N. Bruns for 1890, and exempt him from further highway tax.

Twelfth. To see what action the town will take to protect its clamming interests, and make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Overseers of Poor for 1892 to have procured from town wood-lot sufficient lumber for the erection of a shed on town farm, such as wants of farm require, or act anything relative thereto.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said Town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists at the Town office at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

School Report.

Fellow Citizens of Falmouth:

Another year has come and gone, and it becomes no less our duty than our pleasure to present to you, parents and citizens, the customary annual report. In doing this, we do not propose to enter into tedious details regarding the management and success of the separate schools in each of the twelve districts of our charge, but to give instead a brief glance around the entire field.

Although there have been some faults in the schools for the year just ending, yet perhaps we have no special reason to be dissatisfied, as this ever has and ever will be the case. Most of the schools have been visited twice each term, and all school work carefully noted. At the first visit, if defects in methods of teaching and government were observed, suggestions were made which we thought would improve the schools. In most cases the suggestions were followed with happiest results. At the second visit we examined them on the studies they had pursued. In many cases great improvement was apparent. Some of our schools are taking high rank in scholarship, particularly those in Nos. 7 and 5. As a general thing the teachers have worked hard and faithfully, and in the right direction. Many have realized the importance of their work and have shown an inter-

est in it; but notwithstanding their efforts much of their work has been unsatisfactory since there have been many evils over which they had no control.

From our observation in noting the success of schoels, we find that it depends mainly upon three conditions; first, a suitable person to govern and instruct; second, punctual attendance of the scholars, and last, the hearty co-operation of the parents with the teacher in enforcing such wholesome rules and regulations as are absolutely necessary to accomplish desired results. The opinion of the parent has a great influence over the pupil.

Let no parent be too hasty in judging of the qualifications of a teacher, if he does not do just as he thinks should be done, for unwise remarks, thoughtlessly uttered, have not only injured, but destroyed the influence of many schools; let all strive to improve them. Faultfinding never was known to make a school any better. Assist your teachers in sustaining good order, for without it the school cannot make good progress. A large percentage of our school money is lost, because our scholars fail to attend regularly.

The remedy for the evil lies almost wholly with the parents. Let the parents manifest a practical interest by visiting the schools. Your money supports them, and your children are the scholars—the children you love and to whom you look for the fulfillment of your fondly cherished hopes—the children who are to represent you, and grow up after you, to be your glory or your shame. Neglect no duty that they require. To elevate our schools to that high degree of excellence which we wish them to attain, can be effected, we think, only by the earnest co-operation of parents, teachers, pupils and school officers.

We express the hope that we shall see such co-operation, all striving for a common object,—the education of the youth, their elevation physically, intellectually and morally.

A few words in regard to the text-books. They impose new duties upon both committee and teacher, and in inspecting them some delicate decisions must sometimes be made which may not always be satisfactory to parties concerned. In looking them over we find the books to be in very good condition, clean and nicely kept, with the exception of one or two districts. We would urge upon parents the necessity of teaching their children to be careful and tidy in their handling and use of the books, thereby saving worry and expense. Finally, we commend our schools to the wise, generous regard of the people. They are our hope, as they should be the pride of our town. In them is the germ of all true progress.
